| -the proposal has been in development for |  |
| a couple of years |  |


| -it is a sequential program of study that leads to two separate degrees -Sauder anticipates 60 students per cohort -dual degree programs are attractive options and are a way to draw high quality students to UBC (especially those with offers from other universities); Sauder's MM program currently attracts students from many disciplines, with the largest group coming from Arts -other universities offer undergraduategraduate programs, but they are not common; currently, there is nothing like it at UBC, although UBC once offered a BASc/MEng in Electro-Mechanical Design Engineering (see page 104 of the PDF), which Dr. Bemmels referenced -students will not be admitted to the MM program until they have reached the end of their undergraduate degree; although the MM is not administered by $\mathrm{G}+\mathrm{PS}$, the admission conditions are similar -students will count 6 COMM elective credits from their undergraduate program toward their MM degree, which ultimately saves a term of study -highlights, advantages and benefits of the dual program option were discussed -students receive support and services through Sauder's Business Career Centre beginning in the first year of their undergraduate degrees -each year there are roughly 2000 undergraduate students who are not accepted into the BComm program, so the proposed program option is attractive for those who still want to study business -Sauder does not accept students with an undergraduate degree in business, or even a minor, into its MM program because there is too much overlap; the proposed degree option is specifically for nonBComm students with an interest in business -only UBC MM students can count 6 credits of their undergraduate studies toward their MM programs, an advantage of completing the dual degree option at UBC -the undergraduate-MM and regular MM students will be treated as separate cohorts and will not be merged; the undergraduate-MM students will complete the MM faster (8 months compared to 10) |  |
